USDA Expands Local Foods in School Meals through Cooperative Agreement with Louisiana

On November 14, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) announced it has signed a cooperative agreement with Louisiana for more than \$3.3 million to increase their purchase of nutritious, local foods for school meal programs.

Through the Local Food for Schools Cooperative local farmers. Agreement Program (LFS), of Agriculture and Forestry (LDAF) will purchase

and distribute local and regional foods and beverages for schools to serve children through the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Programs. These products will be healthy and unique to their geographic area, with the goal of improving child nutrition and building new relationships between schools and

"This cooperative agreethe Louisiana Department ment supporting Louisiana schools is another example of how USDA is working to

build a more resilient food system rooted in local and regional production," said USDA Under Secretary for Marketing and Regulatory Programs Jenny Lester Moffitt. "The Local Food for Schools Cooperative Agreement Program provides an opportunity for states to strengthen ties between local farmers, ranchers, food businesses and schools, and gives students access to nutritious foods unique to the area they live in, building stronger connections across local communities."

"Strengthening relationships between local producers and schools is a long-term strategy to ensure our children always have access to nutritious foods in school, a winwin for child health and American agriculture," said Deputy Under Secretary for Food, Nutrition, and Consumer Services Stacy Dean. 






LDAF Brand Commission hosts saddle microchipping event in Bossier

Proper care helps poinsettias thrive through holidays

The holidays are upon us, and scores of poinsettias are available in stores and garden centers throughout Louisiana.

"If you purchase a poinsettia now, you can expect it to last until the New Year if you give proper consideration to selection and care," said LSU Ag-Center horticulturist Allen Owings.

Consumers still favor red poinsettias, but additional colors are available and always attract attention. White, peach, marble and bicolors are in the marketplace along with new colors with names like Ice Punch, Cortez Burgundy and Monet.

"There is even an orange-foliage poinsettia now called Orange Spice," Owings said.

Louisiana has a very large producer of poinsettia starter plants, and many growers in the state produce poinsettias for the holiday season, said LSU AgCenter horticulturist Jeff Kuehny.

"We have lost some of the poinsettia growers in Louisiana as well as across the nation," Kuehny said. "The poinsettia continues to be a tough market for many growers because of the cost of production and the market price."

Louisiana still has many growers who grow on a smaller scale, producing high-quality plant material that will bring them top dollar. "So you can be pleased to know that many Louisiana-sold poinsettias are Louisiana-grown poinsettias. You can buy fresh and buy local poinsettias at many locations around the state," Kuehny said.

Points to consider when purchasing poinsettias for the holidays include the size and number of the colored leaves - which are referred to as bracts. Bracts should be large and extend over the lower green leaves.

The number and size of bracts usually dictate plant price, Owings said. "A premium-quality poinsettia usually has at least six bracts and should have more."

Inspect the lower green leaves on poinsettias, Owings said. Leaves should have good appearance and extend over the rim of the pot. Drooping leaves may indicate problems. Also check for insects, primarily white flies, underneath the lower leaves.

"The most important observation you should make before purchasing a poinsettia is inspecting the green flower parts - called cyathia - in the center of the bracts," Owings said. "These flower parts indicate display life."

Plants with cyathia that are showing yellow pollen and sap will have the least amount of display life left. Plants with smaller cyathia, little to no pollen and no sap will have the longest display life, he said. "A poinsettia should last for four to six weeks in the home with proper care."

To prolong the beauty and health of poinsettias once they are in the home, proper care is essential, Owings said. Although poinsettias do not become acclimated to interior settings as well as most foliage plants, it is easy to be

successful.

Select a location that receives some sunlight. Interior hallways are a poor location. It also is very important to avoid exposing the plant to sudden temperature changes, so don't place the poinsettia near a ventilation system or in a drafty spot near a doorway.

"Temperatures found in most homes are acceptable, and the ideal is to provide 70- to 75-degree daytime temperatures and 62- to 65-degree nights," he said.

As for watering, allow the soil surface to dry out thoroughly before watering with warm water. Just the soil surface should be dry to the touch before watering again. "Avoid water or mist on the colored bracts, and do not let the poinsettia stand in water for more than 30 minutes to an hour," Owings said.

AgCenter-led team receives grant to help farmers irrigate efficiently

When drought conditions set in overall water consumption," in across Louisiana this summer, many farmers resorted to irrigation to try to save their crops. While it helped preserve yields and quality in some cases, the sharp uptick in irrigation raised alarm among those who monitor water usage in agriculture.

With concerns about the sustainability of water supplies in mind, LSU AgCenter engineer Stacia Davis Conger is leading a team to develop an irrigation decision-making app and outreach campaign aimed at helping farmers mitigate drought risks in an environmentally and economically responsible way. She recently was awarded a \$295,860 grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture to support the work.

"The long-term goal of this project is to inspire behavioral change said Conger, who is based at the AgCenter Red River Research Station in Bossier City.

The grant she received is part of a larger effort of the USDA National Institute of Food and Agriculture to "rapidly deploy strategies and fill knowledge and information gaps to protect the nation's food and agricultural supply chains - from production through consumption — during and after extreme weather and disasters," according to an announcement from the institute.

Conger, along with co-principal investigators Carol Friedland and Robert Rohli, is working on an app that will provide farmers site-specific irrigation recommendations based on current drought and hydrological conditions. By pinpointing areas of fields that need

water most and helping determine the timing of irrigation events, this tool will allow farmers to become more efficient, she said.

Friedland, director of the Ag-LaHouse Home and Landscape Resource Center, has extensive experience with mitigating environmental risks such as drought, flood, tornadoes and wind damage. Rohli, a professor in the LSU College of the Coast and Environment who specializes in climate and weather, is assisting on methods for estimating evapotranspiration, which is a major driver of determining irrigation requirements.

Making the best use of increasingly limited water resources is important.

"Excessive irrigation at unsustainable rates may render water resources as environmentally or economically unavailable," Conger said.

Agriculture is responsible for about 38% of water usage nationally, she said, adding that irrigation has been on the rise in the South for nearly two decades. In Louisiana, there is growing concern about the long-term viability and quality of aquifers, which supply much of the state with water.

Recent climate trends have exacerbated these issues.

"Louisiana is the most vulnerable U.S. state to extreme weather events due to its high frequency of natural disasters including flood, hail, lightning, tornadoes, drought, extreme heat and extreme cold," she said. "Of these hazards, drought is the most expensive risk to Louisiana agriculture, accounting for 95% of project crop losses by 2050."

USDA to collect final 2022 crop production and crop stocks data

As the 2022 growing season officially comes to an end, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's National Agricultural Statistics Service (NASS) will contact producers nationwide to gather final year-end crop production numbers and the amount of grain and oilseeds they have stored on their farms. At the same time, NASS will survey grain facility operators to determine December 1 grain and oilseed stocks.

"These surveys are the basis for the official USDA estimates of production and harvested acres of all major agricultural commodities in the United States and December 1 grain and oilseed supplies," said Louisiana State Statistician Kathy Broussard. "Data from the survey will benefit farmers and processors by providing timely and accurate information to help

them make critical year-end business decisions and begin planning for the next growing and marketing season."

NASS will analyze the survey information and publish the data in a series of USDA reports, including the Crop Production Annual Summary and quarterly Grain Stocks reports, both scheduled for release on Wednesday, Jan. 12, 2023.

"Responses to the survey will also be used to calculate state and parish level yields," explained Broussard. "Responding to this survey is a farmers' only opportunity to be included in the calculation of Louisiana parish yields to ensure the most accurate information is reflected in the calculation."

If a survey recipient does not respond by November 29th, NASS may reach out to schedule

an interview to collect the information. As with all NASS surveys, information provided by respondents is kept confidential, as required by federal law. The information is used for statistical purposes only and will not be disclosed in identifiable form. All NASS reports are available online at nass.usda.gov/Publications/. Pointe Coupee Parish Man Arrested for Simple Burglary Involving Saddles

On November 21, a Pointe Coupee Parish man was arrested by Brand Inspectors with the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry's (LDAF) Livestock Brand Commission. The arrest resulted from an arrest warrant from Pointe Coupee Parish following an investigation conducted by the Livestock Brand Commission.


Twenty-one-year-old Calvin Ray Polk, Jr. of Lottie, LA, was arrested on a warrant for simple burglary. An investigation by the LDAF's Livestock Brand Commission determined that Polk allegedly entered a barn in Pointe Coupee Parish illegally and removed two western roping saddles valued at \$3,600. Upon subsequent investigation, one of the saddles was recovered, and additional information was received that merits ongoing investigations in other jurisdictions. Additional arrests are expected as a result of this case. Livestock Brand Inspectors previously arrested Polk in March of 2021 for his involvement in a livestock theft case in Iberville Parish.

Polk turned himself in at the Pointe Coupee Parish Sheriff's Department without incident and was booked on the warrant. At this time, no bond has been set.

"The good news is that LDAF's Livestock Brand Inspectors were able to make this case and facilitate additional investigations as a result," said LDAF Commissioner Mike Strain, D.V.M. "Unfortunately, saddles remain a popular target for thieves. That's why our saddle microchipping program is so important. We've hosted several events this year and will continue to offer this free service to saddle owners in Louisiana."

The Livestock Brand Commission was assisted in this investigation by the sheriff's departments in Pointe Coupee and Saint Landry parishes.

Protect Pets and Horses Against Extreme Cold

The LSU School of Veterinary Medicine asks pet owners to protect their pets against the extreme cold.

Help keep your pet safe during the colder months by doing the following:

- · Don't leave pets outdoors when the temperature drops.
- · Outdoor pets use more energy to keep warm so they will need more food when it's cold. Routinely check your pet's water dish to make certain the water is fresh and unfrozen.
- · If your dog stays outside, provide a doghouse with a raised floor that is large enough to allow the dog to sit and lie down comfortably, but small enough to hold in body heat. Cover the floor with a blanket (but only if the dog will not eat it) or maybe straw or wood shavings if available and make sure the door is turned to face away from the wind.
- If you're feeding homeless cats, be sure to provide an insulated shelter for them.
- Warm engines in parked cars attract cats and small wildlife that may crawl up under the hood. To avoid injuring any hidden animals, bang on your car's hood to scare them away before starting your engine.
- · Antifreeze has a sweet taste that can attract animals, but it is toxic to them. Wipe up spills and store antifreeze and other household chemicals out of reach.

Pets exposed to temperatures in the low teens or single digits for prolonged periods can get frostbite on their feet or the tips of their ears (the skin will turn darker in color). Anoth-



er symptom to be watchful for is lethargy or weakness. If you feel that your pet has been adversely affected by the cold and requires medical care, please contact your veterinarian.

Horses are great at staying warm since they have many metabolic processes that generate heat or allow them to conserve heat. Their digestive processes generate a lot of heat and their haircoat can "puff-up" (this is known as piloerection) to further insulate them. Horses are actually better at staying warm in winter than staying cool in summer.

Precautions that can be taken to protect horses from harsh winter weather:

- · Ensure that the horses have water, hay and shelter 24/7 (if they prefer to remain outside, provide them with an option to have some sort of protection from wind and
- Allow them to move around (this generates

heat); and

• If they are very old, very young, sick, too skinny, etc. and unable to thermoregulate, then they may need to be stalled and/or blanketed, along with all of the other precautions listed above.

The most important precaution is to provide an unfrozen, clean water source on a constant basis; otherwise, the horse could colic.

If your pet or animal requires medical care after-hours, you can contact the LSU Veterinary Teaching Hospital on Skip Bertman Drive; the hospital is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year and remains open even during severe weather or university closures. The number for the Small Animal Clinic (pets and exotic animals) is 225-578-9600, and the number for the Large Animal Clinic (horses and farm animals) is 225-578-9500.

Filing CCC-941 Adjusted Gross Income Certifications

If you have experienced delays in receiving Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) and Price Loss Coverage (PLC) payments, Loan Deficiency Payments (LDPs) and Market Gains on Marketing Assistance Loans (MALs), it may be because you have not filed form CCC-941, Adjusted Gross Income Certification.

If you don't have a valid CCC-941 on file for the applicable crop year you will not receive payments. All farm operator/tenants/owners who have not filed a CCC-941 and have pending payments should IMMEDIATELY file the form with their recording county FSA office. Farm operators and tenants are encouraged to ensure that their landowners have filed the form.

FSA can accept the CCC-941 for 2018, 2019, 2020, 2021, and 2022. Unlike the past, you must have the CCC-941 certifying your AGI compliance before any payments can be issued.

also a beautiful way to honor the season.

Specialty crops aren't just for eating, though! You can find flowering plants and trees, such as poinsettias and magnolias, and cultivated greens, like eucalyptus and holly, all over this holiday season. Add to that the wide variety of Christmas trees available from Louisiana growers, and you're all set for a happy, healthy holiday.

Best of all, Louisiana specialty crops are always easy to find throughout the state. Be sure to visit your local farmers market or retail partners who support Louisiana producers.

LOUISIANA CROP TALK will be highlighting many of the specialty crops mentioned, but first up is a particularly unique one... the tea plant, camellia sinensis.

Fleur de Lis Tea

LDAF Commissioner Mike Strain, D.V.M. recently spent some time with David Barron, owner of Fleur de Lis Tea Company in Amite. Louisiana. Situated on 160 acres of pine forest that Barron bought as an investment for his retirement, the tea farm started out as merely an experiment. Several years ago, a horticulturist friend of Barron's gifted him some tea plants that had been cultivated to be more cold-hardy. Tea plants are historically semi-tropical and wouldn't normally tolerate even the mild Louisiana winters. However, it quickly became apparent that these plants found their happy place in the rolling hills of Tangipahoa Parish.

You may recall that in 2017, which was the very first year Barron planted the tea plants on his property, Louisiana had a record 8-inch snow, followed by more snowfall a few weeks later. Amazingly, Barron says the plants did very well. "They like the climate here, and they love the acidic soil that the pine trees produce," he says. "I got lucky and just picked the right location and the perfect crop."

Barron and his operation have come a long way since then, from a novelty experiment to a labor of love. The team at Fleur de Lis currently grow and process three varieties, including a black tea called

"Big Easy," a green tea called "Morning Mist," and a white tea, called "Starry Night" which is still in development. In addition to the farm, they have also built an event center where they host tours, tasting, and special events on site.

Hans Marchese, who manages everything at Fleur de Lis Tea Company from seeds to production and processing, has a background in biology and chemistry, but he waxes poetic when he talks about tea. He walks us through some important aspects of growing tea, along with what makes Fleur de Lis so special.

Marchese lovingly refers to the terroir, or microclimate where tea grows, which has a significant effect on the flavor. "We could take our variety, grow it 30 miles away, and it would taste different than the tea we're growing here," says Marchese.

Another factor that affects the quality of tea is how many leaves



when you drink hot tea fresh from the fields, you don't need sugar, you don't need lemon, you don't need ice. It's beautiful."

Fleur de Lis also practices a rigid pruning regimen that not only generates new stem growth and more plucking points, but also keeps

are plucked when they're harvested. This is known as the plucking standard. For example, when harvesting leaves for their Big Easy black tea, Fleur de Lis hand pluck a single bud and two leaves, which are the newest, freshest leaves at the top of the plant. Taking more than that can make the tea bitter and create the need for sugar, which Barron insists is not necessary with their tea. "Of course, here in the South we're all used to our sweet tea," says Barron. "But

bushes at a convenient height for hand plucking. Additionally, they rely on soil testing to keep track of exactly what their pH is, another crucial factor in growing tea. Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry Commissioner Mike Strain, D.V.M., reinforced the benefits that LDAF's soil testing labs contribute. "We all work together," says Strain. "It's so important to know your soil and get everything right. When you do, you have a magnificent crop."
