Many of the vegetables that we planted in late summer and early fall are ready to harvest or will be soon. It is important to harvest vegetables at the proper stage for best results, so here are a few guidelines for some common cool-season crops.

If you are not keeping your vegetable garden productive through the winter, you are missing out on one of the most rewarding times of the year for growing vegetables. There is an amazing selection of vegetables that can only be grown here during the cool

include beet, cabbage, carrot, celery, Chinese peas (English and snow), cabbage, collard, endive, radish, rape, rutabaga,

season from October and through the winter garlic, kale, kohlrabi, leek, lettuce, mustard, onion,

shallot, Swiss chard, and turnip. Hardy herbs may also be planted, such as thyme, sage, rosemary, oregano, French tarragon, lavender, chives, cilantro, dill, mints, and parsley.

When to harvest your crops

Root crops are harvested when the root is the proper size. Usually, the top of the root is readily visible at ground level, but it is easy enough to brush aside the soil at the base of the leaves to check on the size of the root. Harvest radishes and carrots when the root is about one inch across. Carrots can be left in the ground once they are mature and harvested as needed, and





Weather Challenges Impact 2022 Soybean Season

The 2022 soybean harvest season in Louisiana was anything but typical. Farmers, elevator operators. and the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry (LDAF) grain samplers and graders were met with challenge after challenge. To start, many areas in Northeast Louisiana received more than 20 inches of rainfall at the beginning of peak harvest time for soybeans. As you can imagine, the massive rainfall made it difficult for farmers, elevator graders (for inbound soybeans) and LDAF graders (for outbound beans) to ensure that the farmer received the appropriate grade for their crop.

According to Commissioner Dr. Mike Strain, "LDAF is an official service provider licensed by the federal government to sample and grade grains grown in Louisiana. LDAF inspectors are required to grade and sample agricultural commodities in accordance with the grain inspection standards established in the United States Grain Standards Act."

Official samples can be obtained by two methods: the probe method can be used after the carrier

has been loaded, or the on-line sampling method can be done as the carrier is being loaded. Samples are graded by a variety of factors such as color, damage, amount of foreign material, and odor. Upon completion of the grading, inspection certificates are issued for grains taken from a variety of storage units including barges, railcars, trucks, and warehouses.

At a recent Louisiana Agricultural Commodities Commission (LACC) meeting in Baton Rouge, Chad Price, LDAF's Grain Program

Manager, presented information on factors that affected Louisiana farmers this year, as well as grain grading processes and how our team worked through the 2022 harvest season. Read on for highlights.

The copious amounts of rain prior to and during this year's harvest most definitely affected grading issues in the 2022 crop. To allow attendees to view the variations of damage in soybeans this crop

year, samples were available that included damage percentages ranging from 2.0% to 40.0%.

According to Price, in 2021 LDAF implemented a hands-on training for grain graders in the elevator facilities. This training is required of elevator personnel in the grade room to assure that qualified graders are grading inbound samples (basically grain that is delivered by truck to the elevator by the farmer). Outbound samples would be grain that is loaded by the elevator for sale (barge/ rail).

Price also discussed the options that farmers have if they do not agree with the elevators grades on their

grain. The farmer has the right to ask for a submitted sample on their inbound trucks (all or a composite for the day) be submitted to the LDAF grain lab for grading. Price also covered the process that is in place by the Federal Grain In-

LDAF encourages preparation for freezing temperatures

With temperatures dipping near or below freezing in parts of the state, Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry (LDAF) Commissioner Mike Strain, D.V.M., urges livestock and pet owners to take necessary precautions to protect their animals. This is also the time to protect plants, pipes, and, of course, people. These are tips to consider now and throughout the winter season.

"When preparing for freezing temps, it is important to take precautionary measures and to do so safely and correctly. For example, not many people realize the risk antifreeze can pose to our pets. Dogs and cats will drink it if it is left out as it tastes sweet; however, it is highly toxic to them. If you drain any of the fluid from your tractor in preparation for the weather, be sure to dispose of it properly. These are things we know how to do, but let's make sure we are doing them the right way," said Strain.

Here are some cold weather tips for livestock, pet, and plant owners:

Livestock

- · Owners should check their livestock and look for signs of stress, illness, or injury.
- · Pay close attention to the young and older animals as they are more susceptible to problems during frigid conditions.
- Provide plenty of hay, feed, energy supplements, and water.
- Be sure to check water troughs as they can ice over.
- · If possible, make adequate shelter available. Even a wind-break will minimize exposure to cold winds.

Companion animals

· If possible, keep all companion animals indoors. If this is not an option, make sure there is a dry shelter available and have

warm blankets for your pet.

- Provide adequate food and water. Monitor water bowls as they can freeze during cold weather.
- Consider a sweater for your short-haired dog.
- Outdoor cats searching for warmth will sometimes crawl underneath the hood of a vehicle. Bang on or open the hood of your car so any animal in there trying to stay warm can get out before you crank up that engine. Cats can be injured or even killed when the car is started.

Plants

- · Move all plants in containers and hanging baskets inside. If this is not possible, group them in a protected area and cover them with plastic.
- Larger plants can be covered with fabric or plastic.
- Thoroughly water plants if the soil is dry.
- For plants growing in the ground, mulch them with dry material such as pine straw and leaves.

"Remember your mulch should be two to four inches thick. Spreading mulch too thick can cause roots to grow shallow and make them more susceptible to death during extended dry periods. You should also avoid mounding the mulch around the base of the plant. The mulch should extend a couple of inches from the base of the plant and be higher on the outside edges to help insulate the plant as well as hold and distribute water," said Strain.

LDAF Requests the Public's Help in **Locating Stolen Logging Equipment**

Agents with the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry's (LDAF) Forestry Enforcement Division are asking for the public's assistance in locating logging equipment stolen in St. Helena Parish.

On November 29, a logging crew in the area of Lloyd Collins Road in Greensburg, LA, discovered a set of "skidder tracks" missing from their work site. A photograph of the stolen property is included below for reference purposes.

You can remain anonymous and may be eligible for a reward of up to \$2,000, resulting in the arrest and conviction of the responsible persons. The reward is offered by the Louisiana Forestry Association.

Vernon Parish Man Arrested on Timber Related Charges

Forty-eight-year-old James er was owed approximately Travis Johnson of Travis Johnson Logging was arrested by the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry's (LDAF) Forestry Enforcement Agents for failing to pay for \$24,000 of timber in Vernon Parish. Johnson was charged one count of Harvest of Forest Products/Failure to Remit Payment.

In November 2022, LDAF agents received a complaint from a landowner in Vernon Parish about not getting paid for their timber. According to the landowner, Johnson Logging was hired to cut their timber and compensate them proceeds from the sale. Once the job was completed, no records or payment had been received, and the landowner stated they were never paid for their timber. Although Johnson was contacted several times, he would promise payment and never show up. The investigation revealed the landown\$24.407.65 for their timber.

On November 16, 2022, Johnson surrendered himself at the Vernon Parish Sheriff's Office on one count of Harvest of Forest Products/Failure to Remit Payment. The bond was set at \$20,000.00.

"Timber theft can take a variety of forms-from harvesting timber without the landowner's knowledge or consent to entering into a formal agreement and not paying them the full purchase price," said LDAF Commissioner Mike Strain, D.V.M. "LDAF agents are committed to helping landowners get paid for their timber in cases like this."

FDA Cautions Horse Owners Not to Feed Recalled Lots of Top of the Rockies Alfalfa Cubes due to Reports of Illness and Death

Fast Facts

FDA, in cooperation with state departments of agriculture in CO, LA, NM, and TX, is investigating cases of illness and death in horses.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration is cautioning horse owners not to feed Top of the Rockies alfalfa cubes with the date codes 111222, 111322, 111422, 111522, and 111622.

These alfalfa cubes have been recalled by Manzanola Feeds of Manzanola, CO, which distributes products directly to feed stores and co-ops in 10 states. Further distribution is possible, so it's important to check the date codes if you have these products.

Top of the Rockies alfalfa cubes are sold in white and tan plastic 50-pound bags with green labeling. The date codes are on the front of the package.

If you have Top of the Rockies alfalfa cubes with these date codes, or you can't be sure of the date code of the products you have, throw them away in a secure container and follow the handling and cleaning instructions below.

FDA is aware of at least 98 horses in Colorado, Louisiana, New Mexico, and Texas who showed neurologic symptoms. At least 45 of these horses have died or were euthanized due to declining health.

The symptoms reported are consistent with botulism, and while further testing is underway to pinpoint the cause of the horse illnesses, horse owners and handlers should take precautions to protect human and animal health.

Immediately consult a veterinarian if your horse ate this product and shows signs of neurologic illness, such as muscle tremors, difficulty eating or swallowing, difficulty standing, or collapse.

What is the problem?

The U.S. FDA is cautioning horse owners not to feed recalled Top of the Rockies alfalfa cubes with the date codes 111222, 111322,

111422. 111522. and 111622. Some of the alfalfa cubes have been reported to contain what appears to be fur and animal tissues, indicating that material from an animal or animals may have been incorporated into the cubes during alfalfa harvesting. Some people have reported a foul odor in some of the bags. Clostridium botulinum, the bacterium that causes botulism, is commonly present in decaying animal carcasses. Testing of the alfalfa cubes and other feed and tissue samples is in progress.

These alfalfa cubes were made by Manzanola Feeds of Manzanola, CO, and FDA has confirmed the firm distributes products to feed stores and co-ops in 10 states: AR, CO, IL, KS, LA, MO, NM, OK, TX, and WI. Further distribution may be possible, so it's important to check the date code if you have this product.

FDA is aware of several horses in Colorado, Louisiana, New Mexico,

and Texas who showed neurologic symptoms, and is working with state authorities to learn more. At least 45 of these horses have died or were euthanized due to declining health. Necropsies of some of the horses are underway or pending. At this time, it appears that Top of the Rockies alfalfa cubes was the only common food source among all of the cases.

This is an ongoing investigation, and FDA will share additional information as it becomes available.

What do I need to do?

If you have Top of the Rockies alfalfa cubes with the date codes 111222, 111322, 111422, 111522, or 111622, or you can't be sure of the date code of the products you have, do not feed them to your horses or any other animals. Throw them away in a secure container and place them in a covered trash can or dumpster so that no other animals can access them. Avoid handling the cubes

directly and wear disposable gloves and a face mask while throwing the cubes away and cleaning any bins or containers where they were kept.

Wearing gloves and a face mask (preferably an N95 respirator), clean out all the empty bins or containers where the alfalfa cubes were kept.

Make a bleach solution by combining 1/4 cup of household bleach to every 2 cups of water.

Completely cover the container with the bleach solution, place a layer of paper towels on top of the bleach, and let sit for at least 15 minutes.

Wipe up any remaining liquid with new paper towels and let the containers air dry.

Clean the area with liquid soap and water to remove the bleach and discard any items that may have come into contact with the contaminated food or containers.

Dispose of the face mask and gloves in a secure trash receptacle



and wash your hands with soap and running water for at least 2 minutes.

If livestock owners are in possession of this product, please ensure that the product is in a secure location where others will not feed it to livestock. At the owner's discretion, owners may also dispose of the product in a location where livestock do not have access to it or by incineration if allowed.

What symptoms have been reported?

Attending veterinarians and state officials have reported that horses have shown symptoms of neurologic illness, including muscle tremors that rapidly progressed to the whole body, weakness, decreased tongue tone, agitation, and inability to stand. If you see these symptoms in your horse, seek immediate veterinary care.

These symptoms are consistent with botulism, and many horses have been treated for suspected botulism. No human illnesses have been reported to date.

How can I report a horse illness?

If you think your horse has become ill after eating contaminated food, call your veterinarian first. If you have fed this product with the associated lot number or no lot stamp at all to your animal(s) who subsequently became ill or has died unexpectedly with neurologic clinical signs, please notify the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry by calling their 24-hour Emergency Hotline at 1-855-452-5323. You can also report the illness to FDA through the Safety Reporting Portal or by calling your state's FDA Consumer Complaint Coordinators. If possible, share the brand name and lot numbers of what your horse ate.

Get your landscape ready for winter before you hibernate

As we wrap up the year, we have many things to do to prepare for winter and spring. Winter is dormancy time for perennials, deciduous plants and warm season turfgrasses. In some ways, it is also dormancy time for us. So, it's time to get things done in the garden before our winter hibernation begins.

Start by prepping your tropical and cold-sensitive potted plants. If temperatures begin to drop into the 30s, you need to get them indoors, in your garage, carport or protected in the corner of a patio.

If you decide to move your plants indoors, watering needs will drop dramatically. Water once a week or when the plants begin to wilt slightly. This helps reduce chances of fungal disease and insect damage. Fungus gnats love rotting roots that have succumbed to saturated potting soils growing fungus. Avoid this by letting the soil dry out before watering again.

In the yard, put fallen leaves to good use in the garden. Rake and keep leaves of deciduous trees to use for mulch material or compost them to provide organic matter for landscape and vegetable beds in the future. Remember to keep

systems. Even though hurricane season is officially over, and winter typically brings less rain, we will get a shower or two. Bag up the leaves, compost them or use them as mulch.

In the vegetable garden, bunching green onions and shallots should be harvested by digging up the clumps. You may replant a smaller clump to continue producing. You can plant beets, Brussels sprouts, cabbage, carrots, celery, cabbage, leeks, lettuce, radishes, shallots, spinach, Swiss chard, and turnips.

In the lawn, take a break. You can still tackle those annoying weeds to get them under control before new springtime growth. Some options for weed control are Scythe, an organic option with the active ingredient pelargonic acid and related fatty acids.

Alternatively, chemical control can be made with liquid atrazine in combination with 2, 4-D, mecoprop, dicamba and carfentrazone for the best results. Follow product label for rates and use a spreader sticker. This is also an opportune time to sharpen mower blades and take care of any mower or weed trimmer maintenance before winter storage.

the roots and rhizomes of tropical plants by spreading a 4-to-6-inch layer of mulch around the base of the plant. You can prune off freeze-damaged limbs and foliage on tropical herbaceous foliage plants such as gingers and philodendrons if you want to keep a neat look to the bed. Heavily mulch cold-sensitive plants and cover them in extended periods of below-freezing weather.

Cover young, tender citrus trees, and use heat lamps during extended freezes. According to retired LSU AgCenter horticulturist Charlie Johnson, the critical temperature for citrus is 28 degrees for more than four hours

When you cover citrus, do so during the daytime before freezing nighttime temperatures. This will help trap radiant heat emitting upwards from the soil into the canopy of the tree. Use bedsheets or frost protection material available from local nurseries.

You can also try plastic or a tarpaulin, but this should be removed during the day to prevent plants from sunburn. Sheets and cloths can be left on for a few days without any damage to the trees. But they will prevent photosynthesis,

In the landscape beds, protect so they should not be left for extended periods.

> In landscape beds, apply mulch at a 2-inch depth to keep weeds in check and to help trap moisture and heat around the root zone. Pine straw, leaves and pine bark are all excellent choices. You can also trim freeze-damaged or dormant perennials back in winter to keep a clean look to your landscape.

> Winter is a great time to plant trees and shrubs. Container-grown trees will be less susceptible to transplant shock during this time.

"In Louisiana, the weather is always challenging for agricultural producers, and this year is no different. the tops can be used as a parsley substitute. Turnips should be harvested when they are 2 to 3 inches in diameter and rutabagas (a close relative) when they are 4 or 5 inches in diameter. Beets are best harvested at 2 to 3 inches and parsnips at 1 1/2 to 2 inches.

Incidentally, to get good production, these plants must be spaced properly in the garden. When the seeds you plant come up, it is very important to thin the seedlings at least as far apart as the width of the mature root in order to get good production. Leaving the seedlings too crowded is a common reason for root crops to produce small or misshapen roots.

Broccoli heads are not harvested based on the size of the head but when the largest individual flower buds are about the size of a kitchen match head. Do not allow the heads to remain on the plant so long that some of the buds to open to produce a yellow flower. Remember that smaller side heads will develop after the main head has been harvested, so leave the plant in place for additional harvest.

Harvesting cauliflower also depends more on the appearance of the head than its size. The curds of the head should be relatively smooth, very much like the cauliflower that you buy in the supermarket. If allowed to stay on the plant too long, the head will begin to separate and lose quality. If you did not blanch your cauliflower by covering the head with the plant's leaves, it may have a purple, green or yellow tint to it. This does not greatly affect the quality of the head.

Leafy crops such as mustard, spinach, Swiss chard, leaf lettuce, collards and turnips should be harvested frequently by breaking off the lowest, largest leaves (this is called cropping). Harvest the entire head of semi-heading varieties of lettuce such as bibb, buttercrunch and romaine when the head is fully developed.

Cabbage is ready to harvest when the head is solid and hard. Cabbage is one of the few crops that may be left in the garden after they are ready to harvest, although the heads may split. If you are going to leave fully formed heads in the garden, rotate the entire plant one-half turn to prevent splitting (this slows water uptake by breaking some of the roots).

Snow peas and edible-pod peas are productive, delicious, and well worth growing. Harvest snow peas when the pods are full size but still quite flat. Edible-pod peas, such as Sugar Snap peas, should be harvested when the pods are full and round but before the peas inside the pod have fully developed. Both types of peas should be checked daily and harvested frequently.

Bunching onions and green shallots can be harvested anytime during the winter when the tops are large enough. Dig up the entire clump and separate off one-half to two-thirds of the

bunch, and then replant the rest to continue to grow and divide for future harvesting.

Cold protection for winter vegetables

Although winter vegetables are generally hardy, new plantings may need to be protected from hard freezes as will certain vegetables at or near harvest stage. If temperatures below 30 degrees are predicted, young seedlings should receive special attention by completely covering them with a 4-to-6-inch layer of loose mulch like leaves or pine straw. The mulch may remain over the plants for a few days but remove it as soon as the freezing episode is over. Plastic covering that don't touch the plants, sheets or floating row coverings may also be used.

Although the plants themselves are quite hardy, the heads of broccoli and cauliflower are prone to cold injury if temperatures drop below 30 degrees. The leaves, flowers and pods of peas may also be damaged by hard freezes. Rather than trying to provide protection, the gardener should consider harvesting all mature and nearly mature produce before the freeze.

The following lists will give you a quick guide to the ability of some vegetables to endure freezes. Remember that such factors as the age of the plant, prior weather conditions and the location of the plants are also factors in addition to the temperatures.

LESS HARDY

Protect or harvest if temperatures are predicted to go below the mid to upper twenties: fava beans, broccoli heads ready to harvest, cauliflower heads ready to harvest, lettuce and peas

MODERATELY HARDY

Will tolerate temperatures down to the mid to low twenties with little or no damage: Swiss chard, Chinese cabbage, kohlrabi, mustard, spinach, radishes, and turnips.

VERY HARDY

Will survive temperatures in the low twenties and teens: beets, Brussels sprouts, carrots, celery, collards, garlic, onions, parsley, leeks, and shallots.
