Dairy important part of USDA food pyramid

Dairy interests are working hard to make sure that dairy foods will be well-represented when the newest version of the United States Department of Agriculture food pyramid comes out in 2010.

The 2010 guidelines are expected to emphasize the importance of regularly eating nutrient-rich foods such as dairy foods, which contain nine essential vitamins and minerals in

significant daily recommended amounts.

The USDA is moving to complete the latest update of the food pyramid and dairy advocates say the science supporting dairy foods prove that nutrient-rich foods like milk, cheese and yogurt will continue to be validated as essentials of a healthy diet.

Focusing on nutrient-rich foods like dairy, which provide the most nutrients per calorie, will provide consumers with a solid foundation on which to build their diets, says Ann Marie Krautheim, registered dietitian and senior vice president of nutrition affairs for Dairy Management Inc., (DMI).

"Many people are defining nutrient density based on what that food doesn't have and aren't really looking at the total nutrient package that food delivers. The Nutrient-Rich Foods Coalition is working to change this approach. The coalition's goal is to work with scientists, experts in the field of nutrition, to develop a validated, scientifically-sound approach that looks at a food's total nutrient package," said Krautheim.

Research shows that choosing foods for their nutritional content leads to better food choices. Eating three servings of dairy every day, as well as other nutrient-rich foods like whole grains, vegetables and fruits provides a tremendous health benefit and a great nutritional bang for the buck. The Dietary Guidelines Advisory Committee, comprised of food and nutrition experts in the U.S., will be looking towards published, peer-reviewed research to develop their recommendations going into 2010.

"The science behind dairy's role in the diet, whether it's for strong bones or helping reduce the risk of obesity, hypertension, or certain types of cancers, solidly supports the need for three to four servings of dairy in the diet every day," said Mary Martin Nordness, nutrition communications director for the Southeast United Dairy Industry Association.

The old United States Department of Agriculture food pyramid that mothers and school dietitians followed had six components.

Bread, cereal, rice and pasta were the keystone elements with fruits and vegetables just above. The protein group of meat, poultry, fish, beans, eggs and nuts and the dairy group sat side by side above fruits and vegetables. At the top were the fats, oils and sweets.

Interestingly enough, the old food pyramid suggested consumers should eat six to eleven servings of foods from the bread group on a daily basis.

As the science of nutrition evolved and advanced new models of food consumption developed, the food pyramid evolved.

Now the USDA recommends that we should eat a more balanced diet from a greater variety of the food groups without counting calories.


The old food pyramid was a "one size fits all." The new one says eat a little bit of everything depending on your lifestyle and how much exercise you get during a week.

The USDA issues a food pyramid once every five years. The website MyPyramid provides dietary and lifestyle guidelines to consumers to promote optimal health and reduced risk for many chronic diseases. It emphasizes fruits, vegetables, whole grains, and fat-free or low-fat milk and milk products along with regular exercise as the foundations of a healthy diet and lifestyle.

Strain said specialty crop grant process open

Commissioner Mike Strain, D.V.M., said the Louisiana Department of Agriculture and Forestry (LDAF) is administering the new Specialty Crop Grant Program. It is designed to fund projects that solely enhance the competitiveness of specialty crops like fruits, vegetables and nuts.

The application deadline is July 24, 2009.

Strain said more than \$337,000 is available for the grant program.

"This is a great opportunity for stakeholders in the Louisiana specialty crop markets to improve their competitiveness," Strain said.

In addition to fruits, vegetables and nuts, the grant will enhance projects that also benefit the dried fruits, horticulture, Christmas trees, turf grass/sod, and nursery

and greenhouse crops.

Grant guidelines state that non-profit organizations and corporations, commodity associations, state and local government entities, colleges, and universities may be eligible.

Applicants must also reside or their business or educational affiliation must be in Louisiana, according to the grant's specifications.

- Cheese (natural e.g. cheddar, mozzarella): one serving is 1-1.5 ounces of cheese or the size of 3-4 cheese cubes.
- Yogurt: one serving is one 6 or 8-ounce container of yogurt.

Montegut cowboy goes from bull rider to bull trainer

It takes a lot of effort to put on a rodeo. Montegut entrepreneur Sheldon Price trains the bucking bulls.

MONTEGUT - When someone hears what Sheldon Price does in his free time, several questions come to mind.

Among them are "Is he crazy?" and "Why?"

Price raises bucking bulls that are used at local rodeos.

What many would think to be a dangerous vocation is much easier than other bull-related things he's done in his life, Price said.

"They're actually not as crazy as you think," Price said. "I only have one who I would call crazy."

After watching him feed his 12 or so adult bulls at his Montegut pasture, you begin to understand what he's talking about.

"I can even go up to them and give them a little pat on their back," Price said with a smile.

According to Price, it isn't until you strap a bull rope on them and put them in a chute that they become dangerous.

"They're animals," he said. "It's really when they get out in that ring when they become unpredictable."

Growing up around horses and bulls rubbed off on Price at an early age.

Price can't remember a time where he wasn't sharing space with some sort of animal.

By 1994, Price was riding bulls at 15.

"I always did like it (bull riding), so when I got old enough to get on them I decided to ride," Price said.

For 10 years, Price mounted bulls on a regular basis.

During that time, he started to pick up on habits and other things bulls might do when he was riding them at different rodeos.

He saw the good, bad and ugly parts of bull riding.

"I got knocked unconscious a few times," Price said. "I've been at rodeos where someone snapped an ankle getting off a bull. It's amazing because sometimes people get more banged up waiting to ride than when they actually ride. For someone like me, I've always loved it - as crazy as that sounds."

Fellow riders and people familiar with bulls were impressed with how much he understood about the large creatures.

This led to an opportunity to be a bull-fighting clown.

"It started early on when I would go to other people's houses to practice," Price said. "Since you don't have a clown out there to help distract the bulls, we had to count on each other out there. My friends would tell me I was good at it, so when they needed someone to assist them at a junior rodeo, I decided to dress up as a clown."

Price quickly found himself in a position where he was called on to rescue a young teen who got his hand stuck in the rope wrapped around the bull he was riding.

"I had to jump in there and wrestle the bull," Price said. "I finally untangled him and got him out of there. At one point the bull kicked me, and I went flying. He broke his leg, but other than that he was fine. His parents actually sent me a thank-you card."

Soon afterward, Price began fielding calls from people interested in him working at their competitions.

"I even went to a few PBR (Professional Bull Riding) events," Price noted.

Around the time he met his wife and they had their first child, Carson, Price chose to eliminate some danger from his life.

Instead of traveling from rodeo to rodeo fighting bulls, the 30-year-old Chauvin native used his bull-sense for something else.

"A few partners and me decided to buy some cows and bulls," Price said. "I eventually bought them out and was left with 70 cows, 12 bulls and 20 babies (bulls)."

Along with his 57 acres in Montegut, he owns another 100 acres in Chauvin.

After submitting a few bids to participate in local rodeos, Price has had the opportunity to bring his bulls to events like a recent rodeo held at the Houma Airbase.

"I won't lie, it's stressful," Price said. "I pretty much do everything for it (rodeo) except serve the concessions."

On the evening of a rodeo, Price estimates he's running non-stop for 18 hours.

"If I don't show up, they don't have the rodeo," Price said. "It's pretty much as simple as that."

In terms of training his younger bulls to buck, he and his brother, Tyler, use an ingenious device called a "bucking dummy."

Once the dummy is strapped on to a young bull, an electrical charge makes the bull start bucking.

The same button that produces the charge also disengages the dummy.

"It's pretty neat," Price said. "Since they're (bulls) so small to get on, it's a way to train them without anyone getting hurt."

His younger brother, who currently rides bulls, said he's probably going to take a similar path as his older brother.

"He put me on my first bull when I was real young," Tyler Price said. "I remember looking up to him and saying that I wanted to do what he was doing. I help him out a lot, and eventually, I could definitely see myself doing the same thing he's doing now with the bulls."

Since he spends much of his spare time with his bulls and other animals, you might wonder if he's formed any sort of attachment to them over the years.

This is especially true once Sheldon starts rattling off all his bulls' names to you.

"You can't," Price said about becoming attached to the bulls. "If you did you wouldn't be able to stay in this business very long. I have one bull that I would have trouble letting go just because I've had him since I started this thing up. Other than that, I just can't let it get to me."

It's no mystery that the Price family is invested in bulls and rodeos for the long haul.

Sheldon Price actually met his wife, Jessica, at a rodeo. "She runs barrels," Sheldon said. "So we even have horses on our property."

Sheldon and Jessica have formed a partnership to help get all the daily tasks done at both pastures despite holding down full-time jobs.

"Whatever time we have left is spent on this," Sheldon said.

With a 16-month-old son and a girl on the way, the couple said their children's involvement in the bull business is up to them.

"We're not going to force it on them," Jessica said.

"I don't want to make them do something they don't want to do," Sheldon added. "But, if they want to take an active role in the business, I'll support them any way I can."

Former residents of sawmill community reunite

FULLERTON - Former residents of Fullerton, a ghost sawmill town, reunited on June 7 at what remains of the site in Kisatchie National Forest's Vernon district in southwest Louisiana.

Most former residents of the town that once had 5,000 occupants are now in their 90s and live elsewhere, but age and distance have not stopped the annual pilgrimage, which began in June 1960.

Bill Bridges, the son of a former resident, now helps organize the reunion. He lives in Sand Springs, Okla., but travels back to Fullerton each year for the event.

Bridges' mother, Marjorie, who died last year, helped organize the reunions for decades. He said that at one time, the event drew more than 2,000 people.

"Everyone has died out, though," he said. "Only a few former residents and their children are left."

Bridges said his mother was around age 15 when the town dried up.

Marjorie was the town's last telephone operator. She was one of the occupants left at the town to help dispose of it when it closed in 1927 after longleaf pine resources were depleted.

"She wrote that it was the saddest job she ever had. As people would leave, they would call to have their phone disconnected and she

would say good-bye to them," Bridges said.

Bridges expected about 10 former residents to be at this year's reunion, along with a sprinkling of family members and history enthusiasts. Those attending will share lunch, stories and pictures of Fullerton.

"It's getting smaller each year, but it's kind of leveled off to about 35 or 40 people," he said.

Bridges said the U.S. Forest Service will be at the June 7 event and officials interested in scanning old Fullerton pictures at the event that people have. He said Forest Service officials looking into new trails and exhibits and are seeking more information on Fullerton.

"They'll scan them in and give them right back," he said.

Bridges said memories of the town are still young in the hearts of former residents and their families. He said storytelling keeps the town alive.

"Most of those people that grew up at Fullerton, that was the best time of their lives, particularly the teenagers. They hadn't yet gotten into the real bad depression. They went out of that and into the Great Depression," he said.

Fullerton, which was operated by Gulf Lumber Company, was once the largest yellow pine sawmill west of the Mississippi River. It was reported to have been the second-largest in the world at the time, with only the Bogalusa mill being larger. In all, some 4.2 million virgin yellow logs were said to have been processed through the mill.

Fullerton began around 1906 as an ambitious dream of Irish immigrant S.H. Fullerton, who came to America in the late 1800s. He first worked as a laborer, but later became the owner of 80 lumber yards in Kansas and Oklahoma.

After a trip to Vernon Parish, Fullerton bought more than 100,000 acres there and, in 1906, established the mill and town.

Two mills operated at Fullerton. They were large enough to handle 90-foot-logs and could produce finished lumber as much as 2-feet in diameter and cut and process more than 200,000 trees annually - enough lumber to fill 500 railroad boxcars each month.

There was also an experimental alcohol plant at Fullerton where chemists tried to distill alcohol from pine byproducts. Prohibition and the demand for water - nearly 2 million gallons daily - forced the plant's closure in 1924.

The height of Fullerton was during World War I, when the population of the town peaked at 5,000. Whites and blacks worked side-by-side producing some of the finest cut pine logs in the South.

The town once boasted, among other luxuries of the day, a commissary, a movie theater, a bank, a drugstore, churches, a hospital, two schools, a Ford auto dealership, a barber shop, a bakery and even a baseball team.

"It was very modern for rural Louisiana at the time. They had electric lights, a swimming pool and things like that. The schools even

offered French and Latin," Bridges said.

A hotel, the Hotel Des Pines, was a grandiose lodge with 60 rooms, running water, electricity, fine dining and fancy chandeliers.

The concrete swimming pool, really for logs, was pumped with the cool waters of nearby Six Mile Creek.

"It was a good place to grow up," Bridges said. "It was a successful life."

When Fullerton closed, the town was reportedly put up for sale for \$50,000 - a bargain considering the town cost over \$3 million to build.

When there wasn't an interested buyer, the structures that weren't stolen or moved were destroyed.

The Masonic Lodge reportedly went to Leesville and the church went to Pitkin.

"There was nothing there to carry a town like that on," Bridges said. "There was no school district. The town was just eliminated."

A 1958 American Press article quoted a former resident, 86-year-old B.F. Polson, who said even the dead were moved.

"Mill officials from St. Louis sold the huge machinery, dismantled the houses and sent them to Houston, Texas. Houston got Fullerton," Polson said.

The site is listed on the National Register of Historic Places and is a remote recreational site in southeast Vernon Parish.

The old logging pond and some foundations of a few of the original buildings remain.

Crustless Spinach Quiche

2 teaspoons canola oil 1 large egg
1 medium yellow onion, finely 1/3 cup no fat cottage cheese
chopped 1/4 teaspoon ground cayenne
1 10-ounce package frozen chopped red pepper
spinach, thawed and drained 1/8 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 cups grated 50% light cheddar 1/8 teaspoon ground nutmeg
6 large egg whites

Drizzle oil in nonstick skillet over medium-high heat. Add onion; sauté for 5 minutes or until translucent. Add spinach and stir for 3 additional minutes, or until spinach is dry. Set aside. Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Lightly coat 9" nonstick pie pan with cooking spray. Sprinkle cheese in pan. Top with spinach mixture. In a medium bowl, whisk egg whites, egg, cottage cheese, red pepper, salt and nutmeg. Pour egg mixture over spinach. Bake for 30-40 minutes or until set. Let sit 5 minutes. Cut into wedges. Serve warm.

Southwestern Taco Dip

2 teaspoons chili powder 1 cup shredded reduced-fat
1 (16-ounce) can spicy fat- Mozzarella cheese
free refried beans 1 cup shredded reduced-fat
1/3 cup chunky medium salsa Cheddar cheese
1 (8-ounce) container plain 1 tomato, seeded and chopped
fat-free or low-fat yogurt 1/3 cup sliced green onion, includ-
1 cup finely chopped iceberg ing tops
lettuce 2 tablespoons chopped black olives

Stir chili powder into beans and spread evenly onto a clear pie dish. Spread yogurt over the bean dip, then spread the salsa over the yogurt, leaving a narrow border around each layer's edge. Scatter lettuce over yogurt mixture. Sprinkle mozzarella and cheddar cheese over lettuce and top with tomato, green onion and olives. Suggested servings: Serve with baked tortilla chips or an assortment of sliced vegetables such as carrots, celery and cucumber.

Sirloin Pita with Herbed Yogurt Dressing

For the dressing:

2 (8-ounce) containers fat-free
plain yogurt
2 teaspoons minced garlic

Warm pita halves in toaster. Into each pita half, spoon 1/4 of the yogurt dressing, mixed salad greens, Blue cheese, onion, steak and tomato. Spoon additional yogurt dressing over top.

Easy, Cheesy Calzone

16 ounces prepared pizza dough 3 cups cooked, chopped
1/2 cup pizza sauce broccoli, drained
2 cups shredded part-skim 1 tablespoon butter, melted
mozzarella

Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Grease a baking sheet. On a lightly floured surface, roll dough to form a 9"x 14" rectangle, about 1/4" thick. Transfer to prepared baking sheet. Spread pizza sauce over half of the dough. Sprinkle cheese over entire piece of dough to within half inch of all of the edges. Layer broccoli on one half of the 14" side (the long side) of the dough. Fold dough in half over the cheese and broccoli filling. Seal edges of the calzone by pressing with the tines of a fork. Prick top. Brush top with butter. Bake for 20-25 minutes, or until crust is lightly browned. Allow to cool for 5 minutes before cutting.

Creamy Carmelicious Milksicles

1/3 cup sugar 1/3 cup caramel ice cream topping
2 tablespoons cornstarch at room temperature
1 1/2 cups low-fat milk 6 (3-ounce) plastic or paper cups
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla 6 freezer pop sticks

Combine sugar and cornstarch in a medium saucepan; gradually whisk in milk. Simmer over medium heat about 2 minutes or until thickened, whisking frequently. Remove from heat, stir in vanilla. Transfer mixture to a large shallow bowl; refrigerate for about 40 minutes or until pudding consistency, stirring occasionally. Drop heaping teaspoonfuls of caramel topping over pudding. Gently swirl into pudding. Spoon mixture into plastic cups; place cups in an 8-inch baking pan or pie pan. Place sticks in center of cups; freeze until firm.

4-H Now

4-H Museum coordinator Rose Anne St. Romain said collecting memorabilia for the new 4-H Museum in Mansura is like a 4-H Christmas morning.

"I'm receiving new donations for the museum every day," St. Romain said. "And everyday it's like opening a new Christmas present and being surprised at the gift."

St. Romain said the LSU AgCenter will be presenting a larger gift to the Louisiana public on July 18 when the 4-H Museum has its grand opening.

"We hope that visitors will be delighted with the museum, the multi-media features and the collections of photos and artifacts which we will add to over time," St. Romain said.

In addition to the multi-media exhibits and collections, the museum will also be the home of the Louisiana 4-H Hall of Fame.


Multi-media? Hall of Fame? A lot has changed in Louisiana 4-H since the boys of Avoyelles Parish formed the Corn Club, the earliest version of 4-H in Moreauville in 1908.

"The core values and life skills that 4-H instills in youth have remained consistent since 1908," St. Romain said. "Project and program offerings have expanded in response to changes in technology and youth interests."

A photograph of that first 1908 Corn Club meeting was loaned to the museum by the Avoyelles Parish School Board and will be featured in the grand opening display, St. Romain said.

"The Corn Club photo is one of the many priceless gems that have come to the museum," St. Romain said. "It's a great find."

4-H is the youth development and outreach program of the nation's land-grant universities and is operated in

Louisiana by the LSU AgCenter. It involves young people in educational projects, camps, activities, trips and school enrichment programs that foster development of life skills in science, engineering and technology, citizenship, healthy living and much more.

And while most 4-H'ers have fond remembrances of their

4-H experience, the 4-H museum is trying to collect those memories and put them under one roof.

The statewide museum celebrates the development of more than 100 years of the 4-H organization's existence in Louisiana. In addition to the multimedia exhibits, the museum will also feature displays of historical 4-H artifacts, photos and documents, St. Romain said.

The AgCenter's statewide call for former 4-H'ers to participate in a scavenger hunt to donate historic 4-H materials for the museum was an overwhelming success, St. Romain said.

"More than 125 people responded and donated or loaned the museum thousands of items," St. Romain said. "There were so many unique things sent in. We're so grateful to everyone who sent in items."

Prizes and recognition were offered to parish 4-H foundations in a number of categories for the collected items.

St. Romain said people related to her how grateful they were for the effect of 4-H on their upbringing.

"Every one of them stressed how 4-H taught them so much and shaped their character," St. Romain said. "It was very powerful and moving. What it tells me is that people saved all these certificates and ribbons because those items are a testimony to the powerful, lasting experience they had in 4-H."

The museum will house the displays and artifacts, but the legacy of 4-H remains with the people it touched, St. Romain said. "The real 4-H museum is inside the people who were in 4-H."

The oldest item, donated by the John V. Lemoine family of Plaquemine, is a wooden butter churn from the 1700s that was used by family members.
